He was like most of us in that he was still a kid inside and would get excited about some of the latest kit reissues that hadn't been produced sense he was a kid. He would tell me stories as a youth in the sixties, the hay day of AMT 3 n1 kits, 1/24 scale slot car racing, and the long ago closed Roanoke Drag Strip. I'm thankful to have know him and thanks to his wife Pat for sharing him with us for all these years. The club will be considering different ways in witch to memorialize Tommy's life in the next few months, bring your thoughts and ideas to the meetings.

The computers haven't blown up yet and now nobody can walk down the street without talking on their cell phone or looking at their PDA. Time is fleeting, it seems like only vesterday that Ed Kennedy. Tommy Carr and I were sharing parttime duties at Hobby USA and talking about forming am IPMS model club and 16 years later we are mourning the passing of one of our founding members. Tommy left us suddenly Thursday, January 7, 2010 and he leaves a void that cannot be filled. Tommy was more than a fellow modeler, he was a great organizer, event planner, automobile and aviation historian. collector. artist and draftsman, but more that these, he an even better friend. I remember our first road-trip as a chapter, traveling northeast to the DC area to take in a model contest that we had all looked forward to, only to arrive a week late for the show!! We weren't deterred however as we spent the day in Buzz Polistocks, "Air, Land and Sea"

model shop in Alexandria, looking over the styrene treasures we hadn't seen since our youth. We all "oohed" and "aahed" over Airfix. Pvro, Tamiya, Renwal and other brands of plastic "art", thinking we had hit the "Holy Grail". Tommy was a font of information, giving the background and history of most everything we fondled. As Ed and I battled over a 1/72 Tamiya Shinden, I could see Tommy giving us that sly grin of knowing that this was not the only one of its kind, but we were lost in that world of model collecting, a world that most everyone reading this can relate to. We shared many more road-trips with Tommy, usually him at the wheel of his beloved Saab 900 that saw many road miles with me riding "shot-gun". One of our many trips was to Richmond for the Old Dominion Open, a trip we took many times and led to the creation of our own "Virginia Shoot-Out", a contest that Tommy thought up during his term as President of the Club. Tommy worked with Mark Elder of Richmond and came up with an idea for a challenge contest that Roanoke, Richmond and Tidewater could all participate in, building the

He has extremely big shoes to fill, for a relatively small guy. Tommy was our first newsletter editor and coined the name "Sprue" which we still use to this day. Tommy was a driving force in our D-Day model creation for the History museum and helped create and run the annual D-Day Memorial fund-raiser in Bedford. He also help create some of our most fun activities, the "Springnational" drag-races and the November "Carrier Landings" which his Jap Zero kept getting beat out with my PT Cruiser. A lot of good memories, too many to list here, but I've recollected some of my favorites. Please join me in celebrating Tommy's life and keep Tommy's wife, Pat in your thoughts and prayers. Moe Howard is the first American actor to impersonate Hitler, predating Chaplin's "The Great Dictator" by nine months.

In the short film, three cabinet members are discussing solutions to the economic woes of their Kingdom, Moronica. Since the King of Moronica wants peace, which is not economically profitable, the cabinet members plot to overthrow him, institute a dictator and start a war. They find Moe Hailstone, who with his cronies, Larry and Curly, is busy wallpapering the dining room.

They offer him the greatest opportunity of his life – to be a dictator.

Pondering it, Moe runs his hand through his hair. Scratching under his nose, he accidentally attaches a piece of dark wallpaper that was stuck to his finger. This makes him look like Hitler. Curly's character becomes Field Marshal Gallstone (Goring) and Larry's Propaganda

Moronica gets a new flag – snakes entwined into the shape of a swastika, and a slogan, "Moronica for Morons!", a play on the Nazi slogan "Deutschland für Deutschen". There is talk of a beer hall putsch, Moe orders a book burning, and sends an innocent man to a "concentrated camp."

The Stooges worked several phrases of Yiddish into their dialogue with double-entendres, cultural references, and sexual references that got by Hollywood censors enforcing the Hays Code. Moe: "We'll start a

'Blintzkrieg'" (blitzkrieg). Curly: "I just love blintzes, especially with sour cream." In Moe's imitation of a Hitler speech, he says "in pupik gehabt haben" (the semi-obscene "I've had it in the bellybutton" in Yiddish). References are also made to Goring's morphine addiction.

Following it's release, isolationists and pro-German groups protested the film, and threats of arson were received. Moe Howard was placed on Hitler's death list.

Although the Stooges are killed in "You Nazty Spy", they will be back running Moronica in the sequel, "I'll Never Heil Again", released in July 1941, five months before Pearl Harbor.
